The kids were busy with everything from making Slime and LEGOs creations to creating LED flying helicopters. On the Adult side, we continued our foreign film series, played Bingo and Trivia and had our first ever Library Blood Drive. We will be repeating this in December. We will also continue our Memory Connection Programs this fall with: Journey of Dementia, Difficult Conversations, Aging Memory; What's Normal and Healthy Brain Screening - a noninvasive first step toward diagnosing a memory issue. For fun, we will learn how to Skype, play Trivia, make holiday cards and more. 

I am excited to announce that the North Shore Library is the recipient of the Wisconsin Library Association's 2019 Programming Innovation Award! This award recognizes a Wisconsin library for distinguished achievement in developing an innovative program for library patrons. As the first library Memory Connection Center in the nation, the North Shore Library empowers caregivers with the knowledge, resources, support, and programs that are necessary to prepare families and individuals for the journey of caring for someone diagnosed with dementia. In addition to monthly programs and events, resources include iPods with customized music, engagement kits and activities that encourage conversation, dexterity, and continuing education.

Take a look at the bottom of your library receipt next time you check out. It gives you an estimate of how much money you saved by borrowing the items rather than purchasing them. North Shore Library patrons saved more than \$4.7 million dollars in 2018 alone! Your library card is the biggest money saver in your wallet. Use it often!

Summer Reading Program

A UNIVERSE OF STORIES

The Youth Services Department at the North Shore Library finished another exciting Summer Reading Program! Our Summer Reading Program is free to all participants thanks to the generous donations from The Friends of the North Shore Library. This year's slogan was "A Universe of Stories" and focused on space. Participants ranged in age from one to seventeen years old.

In order to prevent summer learning loss, our Summer Reading Program encourages reading to both reluctant and voracious readers in our community. Children and teens read to earn passes to unique experiences around town, raffle tickets and more. Passes include admission to the Schlitz Audubon Nature Center, Wisconsin State Fair, Milwaukee County Zoo, Milwaukee Public Museum, as well as discounted tickets to the Milwaukee Bucks and Milwaukee Brewers. Business in the community, such as Breadsmith, Cost Cutters, Pizza Studio, Dr. Dawg, Nothing Bundt Cakes, and more generously donated coupons to our program. We also rewarded readers who participated in the program with raffle prizes, giving away almost 50 prizes to early readers, kids and teens. Every child and teen who completed the Summer Reading Program received a book of their choice as a final prize. Almost 400 books went home with participants to become a part of their home libraries.

This summer, 965 children and teens registered for our Summer Reading Program and 196 children and teens also participated in weekly Summer Reading Bingo, a weekly program of valuable learning activities to keep families active. Each week, participants of Reading Bingo earned an additional prize by completing a bingo. Each week a new Reading Bingo worksheet was distributed with new, fun activities for families.

We continued our Pen Pal program this summer and paired children and seniors in a postcard exchange at the library. Pen Pals exchanged post cards at the library, sharing interests, memories from childhood, and favorite books. Children practiced their reading and writing skills and learned about letter writing. Seniors developed new relationships and supported young learners. At the end of the program, children and seniors met for our Pen Pal Picnic and had fun chatting, learning more about each other and making lasting memories.

Donations provided by the Friends of the North Shore Library allowed us to provide fun and engaging handson learning opportunities. During our Summer Reading Program we offered 74 programs and classes for children and teens, both inside and outside of the library. A total of 1,928 people attended our programs this summer. We kicked off the summer with a music performance, scavenger hunt and ice-cream generously donated to the library.

The Youth Services Department hosted entertainers, storytellers, and educators at the North Shore Library. Families learned about space with staff from



the Milwaukee Public Museum and the Wehr Nature Center. Teens learned about the history and significance of Henna during "The Art of Henna." On Tuesday afternoons, families were delighted with magicians, jugglers, comedians, animals and a fairy show.

Youth Services Staff planned and presented programs that engaged youth this summer, including a Slime Science program during "Library Makers," a Light-Up Helicopter class for teens and much more! Young children and their families attended special story times including a "Book Boogie" dancing story time and a "Story Book Brunch" that explored unicorns and dragons. Our popular LEGO club continued with challenges like "Build Your Own Skyscraper." Teens were able to explore the universe

of crafts with a "Nebula Jar" program in which participants created colorful space scenes inside a jar and "Galaxy Prints" which used fabric paint to make a galaxy on a T-shirt.

library, Youth Services Staff along with Adult Services Staff visited many community events in order to promote the Summer Reading Program, library services and to meet and talk to community members. This includes a monthly visit to the Fox Point Farmers Market. Staff also visited Glendale's Music in the Glen and National Night Out.

Inside the library, staff saw many repeat visitors over the summer. In the Children's Room, kids could take their picture in front of our "Galaxy Photo Booth" or climb

into a cardboard space ship. Teens could color one of our many calming space coloring sheets in the teen area. Book displays kept kids and families excited about space and gave them lots of reading materials to use to finish the Summer Reading Program.

We are already excited to begin planning activities for next year's Summer Reading Program. The theme of next year's program is fairy tales, mythology and fantasy. The slogan is "Imagine Your Story."
