Thanks to the generosity of the Friends of the Library, we continue to offer a free afternoon tutoring program for children in 3rd grade and up. Students can drop in for after-school homework help on Thursdays from 3:30-5:30.


Did you know that the library offers two technology classes each month? Classes offered this spring include: How to use CountyCat, the Library Catalog; Android Basics for Seniors; Introduction to PowerPoint; Microsoft Word; and Smarter Searching on the Internet. If there is a topic you are interested in, let us know and we will try to add it.

You can now digitize your memories at the library. The Library has acquired the Epson V600 scanner for patrons to use. The scanner can digitize old photos, slides, and film so that you can preserve your family memories. We provide monthly training so that you can learn how to use the scanner. It is available for in-library use, and step-by-step instructions are available so you can use it with ease. The library also owns VHS to DVD conversion equipment. We offer monthly tutorials and have a kit to use at the library and one to check out and use at home.

The Youth Services Department also offers classes and programs for school age children that focus on a range of topics including Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math (STEAM), maker projects, and of course, reading. Ages 6 and up.

This is a hands-on storytime for homeschooled families. We'll explore a specific topic through stories, activities, and writing. Younger siblings are welcome. February 22, March 8, March 22, April 5, April 19, and May 3.
